DD2 driver David Griffiths says he will be retiring from the Super One championship next year to concentrate on his kart manufacturing firm. His decision comes after not being able to put time into testing on the geared karts. "It's been two years since I was last on a DD2," he said. "I never got the chance to test and so will be focusing on my business of making the GMS chassis models."

Woe for Babington

Super One and EuroMax champion Sean Babington had a torrid time at the World Grand Finals in Portugal last weekend. The Kent-based driver suffered with engine problems and eventually found a sticking brake disc as the source of his ills. By then he had just scraped into the finals with a fifth in the repurchase, only to be excluded for an incorrect carburetor jet. The team appealed and he was able to race on under the appeal without success.

Scott in hot water

Harrison Scott, appearing at his first Rotax Grand Finals took second on the road in the Senior Max pre-final in Portugal but was given a three second penalty for coming out of the tramlines at the start. He fell back in the final and battled to tenth. The 16-year-old's family has a house only 30 minutes from the track.
